# Spring Term in Full Swing

Winter Blues, Blue Monday? Not at North. The children and staff have been far too busy. The cold weather has even helped Key Stage 1 who spent the 11th and 13th enjoying a polar experience (see below). Year 2 have started gymnastics lessons with PE Teacher Rachel Taylor

from St. Helena (pictured right) in preparation for a gymnastics festival in a few weeks time. Rachel was really impressed with the children's concentration and performance during the first lessons held on the 12th. An encouraging start. Year 5 and 6 have started a new project. Our sports coach Mrs. Eves writes, "Over the next 6 weeks, year 5 is participating in a project being run by Colchester United. Coach Mark



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(pictured above). It is called **Learn and Move** and involves the children taking part in a theory session and then putting what they have learnt into a practical lesson. The aims of the project are to introduce the concept of exercise; including the effect exercise has on the body and the social aspects of exercise. The first session yesterday focussed on why it is important to exercise and learning how to take their pulse. In the practical session they tried to raise their heart rate by doing lots of running games. It was a fun lesson and we are looking forward to next week." Sadly our first football fixture of the term was called off on Thursday because our opponents could not make it. The forecast was shocking and so the players were asked if they wanted to still have their football training at St. Helena. They were unanimous. So we all endured the freezing rain for an hour and a half and enjoyed every minute. What a great attitude.

A very successful **Monarchs' Week** was held in Key Stage 2. Mrs Skinner writes, "This is an annual event which allows the children to study a theme in history over a long period of time. Each year group studies a different British Monarch: Year 3 -Queen Elizabeth I. Year 4 -King James I. Year 5 -Queen Victoria . Year 6 -Queen Elizabeth II. The week began with the KS2 LSA team transforming our junior hall into a palace. Throughout the week the children have investigated and answered the following questions: When did this monarch reign? What would we have seen during the monarch's reign? Who might this monarch have



been speaking to? What impact did this monarch have on the country and finally what is this monarch's legacy? They used a selection of 'historian' skills to research information about the events of each period such as the punishments given to criminals by the Tudors or the Court dances of James I. They analysed evidence and deduced facts from history by looking at paintings from each era such as the image of a governess from Victorian times and they carried out surveys to find out about changes in the history of listening to music in modern times. All of the children have a Monarchs' Week topic book where all of their work is recorded and remains with them throughout their time in Key Stage 2. Our week ended with a fantastic open afternoon where parents were invited into to come and find out what the children had been learning. A visitors' book captured the success of the week. For example, "I was really impressed by how much you have done in one week. The art was a good talking point for us." "The afternoon was amazing.

Loved looking at how hard everyone has been working. We took a walk through the palace and it was beautifully decorated."

Something completely different was taking place elsewhere in the school. Miss Jacobs writes, "Brrr! There was an icy chill coming from the Infant Hall this week as Key Stage 1 launched their new topic for the term and each class visited the hall for a polar experience. Everyone dressed for the event in their coats, hats, gloves and scarves before setting off to the chilly hall - windows open, heating off and a fan blowing cold air – creating a suitably cold atmosphere! Once inside the children visited a base camp with tents, sleeping bags and a camp fire, an area to try on snow boots, goggles, rucksacks and a sledge to ride on and a cave area with ropes 'for climbing' and 'caves' to explore. They tried some ice fishing and compared their own



heights with those of polar animals – no one was as tall as a polar bear but some of us were as tall as an Emperor penguin. They also got to feel real ice and find out more about polar animals. The experience ended with a virtual sleigh ride where we were

pulled by 18 speedy huskies at 20mph before everyone warmed up with a hot chocolate and marshmallows. What a great start to our topic and a huge thanks to our marvellous team of LSA's who organised and prepared the whole event."
