PURPLE PINKY POLIO CAMPAIGN

Three members of Colchester Rotary Club visited the school on the 7th to promote their worldwide campaign to eradicate polio. The children sat and listened with great attention as Ian explained what the illness is and how it can be prevented through immunisation. Polio was common in this country and most countries around the world until about 60 years ago now it is controlled through vaccination. Bill Gates supports their charity and for every pound the Rotary Club raise he donates £2. £3 pays for 15 vaccines. Robert has been to see the vaccination programme in India where 175 million children were vaccinated in one week. Incredible! North like many Colchester schools are supporting this campaign this year.

So we would like all children and staff to come to school in pink or purple on Wednesday 21st February and we would like you to donate some money to support the charity.
