




### Governors' Corner with Mubeena Siddiqi

On 3rd March, several governors visited classrooms throughout the school to monitor how reading is being taught and promoted at North. Children were enthusiastically working alongside their teachers and peers to read poems and stories, then using ideas from the reading to create their own writing. The children were being taught a variety of techniques to develop their reading and writing skills. We observed teachers reading poems and stories aloud, followed by the children repeating the passages using fantastic expression. When children came across unfamiliar words, they used their deduction skills to guess what the word may mean in context or substituted another word (synonym) to see if the sentence made sense. Once they made their predictions, children were able to use the dictionary to confirm their guesses. Classrooms were also full of resources to promote reading as an enjoyable past-time rather than just an academic requirement. Classrooms have dedicated reading corners that children can use to read for fun or relaxation. The classes also featured displays with "Authors of the Term" highlighting books by a favourite children's author. We also spoke to children to get their views and feelings about reading. Most children LOVE reading. One pupil said, "I like reading. Sometimes there is a part that blows your mind and you feel you are in the story". The children also valued going to the school library every week and looked forward to time in the reading corner. However, while all the children stated that they read regularly at school, a lot of children said they were not reading at home. Of the children that read at home, most had an established routine of reading after dinner or at bedtime. Some children had a favourite spot at home which was quiet and free from distractions. All of the children who read at home had access to books which they found interesting. On this note, we would like to get your feedback. What do you think would help create a culture of reading at home? What are the barriers or challenges that keep your children from reading outside of school? Do you have a book lover at home? If so, please share your ideas on what your family is doing to promote a love of reading. Essex Libraries is also a wonderful and free resource and we are lucky to have our own branch in Town Centre!
